BRITISH SKYDIVING 4-WAY NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS 2026

GENERAL RULES, INFORMATION & LOGISTICS

(Note: this document details the general rules, information and logistics, and should be read alongside document "British Skydiving 4-Way FS Nationals Technical Rules 2026" which sets out the technical rules. All competitors will accept these rules as binding on entering the competition.)

1. COMPETITION CATEGORIES

- a) The competition shall comprise the following categories:
- 4-Way Formation Skydiving Sequential – AAA
 - 4-Way Formation Skydiving Sequential – AAA (Open)
 - 4-Way Formation Skydiving Sequential – AA
 - 4-Way Formation Skydiving Sequential – A
 - 4-Way Formation Skydiving Sequential – Rookie

2. COMPETITION AIMS

- a) To determine the British National Champions in 4-Way Formation Skydiving.
- b) To determine the British standings of the competing teams.
- c) To promote and develop 4-Way Formation Skydiving Competition.
- d) To allow participants to share and exchange experience, knowledge and information.
- e) To improve judging methods and practices at National level.
- f) In the event of any circumstances that result in no National Championship competition jumps, the criteria used for the British team/s or individuals to be selected to represent Great Britain at international competitions will be at the sole discretion of the Elite Performance Committee (EPC). Alternative selection processes can be found on Form 231.

3. GENERAL INFORMATION

Warm-up / Practice Jumps: The host DZ's normal operating hours shall apply in the days leading up to the competition: please refer to DZ website and / or contact DZ for details. Practice jumping on the day immediately prior to the competition start date will be available up until the competition draw, subject to suitable meteorological conditions. Any practice jumps must be paid for in full prior to competition start. The DZ reserves the right to stop any



teams owing monies for practice jumps from completing any further jumps (including during the competition) until outstanding balances have been paid for in full.

To facilitate a punctual competition start time, competitors are expected to have completed **all** administrative tasks during the previous day. If any competitor foresees a material (and reasonable) issue with complying with the above they shall liaise with the host DZ to understand the practicalities of completing such tasks outside the prescribed time windows.

4. ENTRY FORMS

- a) Entry forms are to be completed online, a link of which will be made available on the British Skydiving website.
- b) Amendments to team entry forms may be made after submission up until the Entry Form deadline; however, to do so, teams shall contact the host DZ and follow its instructions on preferred process such that an auditable record of final team makeup can be retained for future reference.

5. FEES & TERMS

- a) Pool Camera Flyers shall be considered competitors, and as such teams are expected to pay for the Pool Camera Flyers' share(s) of the jump fees due herein.
- b) All entry fees and jump fees for all planned competition rounds must be paid for in advance, with any outstanding balances settled no later than the end of the Competition Check-In time window. **Note:** the AAA and AAA (Open) categories will normally have a different number of planned competition rounds than any other category.
- c) The Team Captain (specified on the Team's Entry Form) shall be liable to the host DZ for ensuring payment of the team's entry fees, jump fees and Pool Camera Flyer's fees due by the team, irrespective of any team line-up changes permitted (or otherwise) by the competition rules.
- d) In the event of any competitor being unable to complete any part of the competition (for whatever reason), jump fees for jumps not made are only refundable at the host DZ's sole discretion.
- e) All jumps made - regardless of their inclusion or exclusion from the overall competition scores - will be charged for (i.e. any partially completed rounds, for any reason whatsoever, need to be paid for). Re-jumps and jump-off jumps will



need to be paid for in full prior to taking place and will not be taken from any other jump credits.

6. COMPETITOR EQUIPMENT & DOCUMENTATION

- a) It is each individual competitor's responsibility to ensure that all documentation provided - and equipment used - is in a serviceable condition, is suitable for the individual (and the intended nature of use), complies with the requirements of the British Skydiving Manual, and complies with any additional host DZ's Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs).
- b) If a competitor has any doubts as to the suitability of their equipment or documentation, they must contact the host DZ in advance of the competition start date to seek clarity and resolve. This will avoid unnecessary logistical challenges during competition.
- c) As a minimum competitors shall use / have available for use:
 - i. A serviceable and suitable main parachute, reserve parachute, container and harness,
 - ii. An electronic Automatic Activation Device (AAD),
 - iii. A helmet (with a single-point release / cutaway system if performing the role of Camera Flyer or Pool Camera Flyer),
 - iv. A hook knife,
 - v. A visual altimeter,
 - vi. An audible altimeter (if performing the role of Camera Flyer or Pool Camera Flyer)*
 - vii. Suitable footwear and clothing.

* Audible altimeters are highly recommended for all competitors, regardless of their team role.

- d) As a minimum for kit and documentation checks, competitors shall have available for inspection:
 - i. The kit (comprising the list in paragraph 7(c) above) intended for use during the competition,
 - ii. A record of inspection (if packed in the UK) and a valid and in-date reserve packing data card for the reserve parachute intended for use during the competition,
 - iii. The competitor's current and fully updated Parachutist's Logbook,
 - iv. The competitor's valid British Skydiving Membership (Full or Temporary),
 - v. The competitor's current Medical Certificate or Declaration,
 - vi. The competitor's British Skydiving National Parachutists Licence with an FS1 sticker, and a Chief Instructor approval for formations of more than 3 people. A logbook endorsement of the latter shall suffice.
- e) Any competitor not holding a British Skydiving Licence (but holding a licence from a different nation) should contact the host DZ to seek confirmation as to whether their particular licence (and any discipline-specific qualifications) are adequate prior to entering the competition. The competitor must also comply with all other rules set out herein.



7. COMPETITOR ELIGIBILITY & SPORTING LICENCES

- a) British Skydiving has decided to comply with the FAI rules regarding competitor eligibility. Please refer to the FAI Sporting Code – General Section, which can be found on the documents page of the FAI website: <https://www.fai.org/isc-documents>.
- b) Competitors are not required to hold any Sporting Licence – nor be eligible for a UK Sporting Licence – to take part in the British Skydiving 4-Way National competition; however, competitors wishing to take part in the competition to the “AAA” dive pool who (at the point of entry form submission) **are not** eligible for a UK Sporting Licence may only enter as part of teams competing in the AAA (Open) category. For the avoidance of doubt; there are no restrictions that apply to the nationality or UK Sporting Licence eligibility of competitors competing in the Senior (Open), AA, A or Rookie categories, and UKSL points can still be accrued by teams in all categories in accordance with the applicable UKSL rules and paragraph 8(e) below.
- c) Only teams competing in the AAA category shall be considered by EPC for representation of Great Britain at international competitions.
- d) UK Sporting Licence eligibility criteria can be found on the British Skydiving Form 110.
- e) Pertaining to the AAA (Open) category only: only the overall winning team shall receive medals, but – subject to compliance with all other applicable rules – all teams in the AAA (Open) category shall be eligible for UKSL League Points by applying the following points allocation process:
 - i. All AAA and AAA (Open) category teams’ scores are listed (as though all teams shared a single category), and sorted highest to lowest to determine placings.
 - ii. UKSL League Points are then awarded in accordance with Section 8 of the applicable UKSL rules.
 - iii. In the event of a tie in the British Skydiving 4-Way Nationals scores, the team with the highest score in any completed round will settle the tie. If this does not break the tie, the judges will refer to the FAI rules.
 - iv. Tie breaks will only be used to decide first, second and third placings. All other placings will remain joint (e.g. multiple teams may place 4th for the purpose of UKSL League Point allocation, and so all of these team shall be awarded 5 x UKSL Points).
- f) Competitors selected for representation of Great Britain at any international competitions must hold a UK Sporting Licence, and be included on the FAI database by British Skydiving, at the point of entry for (and not later than one month prior to) the competition in question.
- g) All members comprising a team that sets a world record must have a current Sporting Licence for that record to be recognised and recorded as such. Teams that judge they are likely to set a record are therefore encouraged to obtain Sporting Licences prior to the British Skydiving 4-Way Nationals competition.



- h) Competitors may obtain a new Sporting Licence or renewal at any time. Applications for a Sporting Licence or renewals must be made using the British Skydiving Form 110 directly to the British Skydiving office. A fee applies. Sporting Licences or renewals will no longer be issued at British Skydiving PTOs. Sporting Licences should be applied for at least one month before the deadline for which they are required since British Skydiving will require supporting documentation for those competitors not holding a UK passport.
- i) Any competitor not holding a British Skydiving Licence (but holdings a licence from a different nation) should contact the host DZ to seek confirmation as to whether their particular licence (and any discipline-specific qualifications) are adequate prior to entering the competition. The competitor must also comply with all other rules set out herein.

8. DRUG TESTING

British Skydiving fully supports Drug-Free Sport and is committed to preventing drug misuse in sport parachuting. Drug misuse is cheating and it may prejudice your safety and the safety of others. There is no place for the misuse of drugs in our sport. British Skydiving's Anti-Doping Policy and Rules are set out in British Skydiving Form 220 which is downloadable from the British Skydiving website and available on request from the British Skydiving Office.

ANY COMPETITOR may be required to take a random drugs test. Refusal to provide a urine sample for analysis will result in disqualification. Many medications that you may need to take for common medical conditions, such as asthma or hay fever, may contain Prohibited Substances. It is vital that you do not accidentally take a prohibited substance, the consequences are the same as if you were doping. Getting it from a doctor on prescription is no defence!

Each competitor is STRICTLY LIABLE - this means that it is your own personal responsibility as a competitor to ensure you comply fully with this policy. A positive test result means disqualification for the whole team, a loss of any sponsorship, and a ban for the individual. British Skydiving Form 220 sets out the procedure to be followed in the



event of a positive test. The test is concerned with whether a prohibited substance is present in the body, not how or why it got there.

The Therapeutic Use Exemption (TUE) application process gives competitors a means of attaining approval to use a prescribed Prohibited Substance or Method for the treatment of a legitimate medical condition. This process is in place to protect the rights of competitors to compete on a level playing field.

Any competitor with a TUE must attach a copy to the competition entry form and must also file a copy with the British Skydiving Office before he or she competes. TUE forms may be downloaded from the anti-doping section of the FAI website: <https://www.fai.org/anti-doping>.

9. COMPETITION AIRCRAFT

- a) At time of writing the competition aircraft are expected to be two aircraft from: x2 2 Dornier G92 and x2 Cessna Supervan.
- b) Each numbered round will be performed from the same aircraft type (for all categories) to avoid any unfair advantages / disadvantages for any particular team.
- c) Teams will perform the rounds in whichever order facilitates the most economic use of the time available to complete the competition within the allotted time. Scores may therefore be posted out of numerical sequence.

10. COMPETITION OFFICIALS

Competitors will be notified of the attending officials during the Competition Brief.

11. MEET DIRECTOR TERMS OF REFERENCE

The Meet Director responsibilities are as follows:

- a) Ensure liaison with the Drop Zone for the administrative co-ordination of the event schedule.
- b) Ensure a visible point of contact amongst the competitors is maintained at least for 25% of the event time to allow the opportunity for feedback and clear access to officials.
- c) To have the casting vote on any matters identified by the Chief Judge.

12. PRIZE GIVING LOGISTICS

- a) Prize giving will begin as soon as the host Drop Zone can arrange after the event has been completed and once any dignitaries who will be involved in the presentation are available.
- b) Competitors shall return any 4-Way National trophies from the previous year's competition to the Chief Judge when completing this competition's check-in, or (if this is not possible) to

the British Skydiving Office by June 2026. Trophy winners will be required to sign the Trophy Safe Custody Statement (Form 225), and adhere to the points listed on this form.

- c) Medals will be awarded for the top 3 placing teams in each discipline in each category except for the AAA (Open) category for which only the overall winner will receive a medal.

13. LICENCE TO USE RECORDED MEDIA

In entering this competition, competitors agree to grant British Skydiving a royalty-free non-exclusive licence to use any video or other images submitted to the competition.

14. COURTESY & RESPECT

The CI, Meet Director, Judges, Staff and competitors all have the right to be treated with courtesy. Any threatening or abusive behaviour will not be tolerated and will result in the individual being removed from the competition and being asked to leave the host DZ premises. Subject to the nature of the incident the team comprising the implicated individual may be removed from the competition and all fees forfeited.
